Our FOCUS

MADI focuses on all mineral resources- oil, gas and solid minerals. MADI puts emphasis on Minerals value chains and mineral commodities as Africa pushes for promoting resources based industrialisation.

Our Activities

Since our inception in 2019, MADI has grown by leaps and bounds and here are some of our notable activities:

• Training of Small-Scale Miners on EHS Guidelines in Namibia

This project was carried out in partnership with UNDP ad the major objective of the project was to provide training to ASM miners in Erorngo Region in Namibia on the full implementation of the Environmental Management Plan (EMP) and Environment Health and Safety (EHS) best practices.



AMREC Pilot Project

In collaboration with the Makerere University Business School (MUBS), Uganda's Ministry of Energy and Mineral Development, Heriot-Watt University and Edinburgh Business School, MADI was able to implement an African Mineral and Energy Resources Classification and Management System (AMREC) pilot project.

The technical team carried out fieldwork activities in various districts in Uganda such as Mubende Kasanda District, Isingiro and Kasese to collect data that would later be used to make informed decisions on the status of minerals in Uganda

MADINI Convention

The Madini Convention is a grand gathering on mineral issues which was convened by Minerals Africa development Institution (MADI). The Convention brought together over 10,000 delegates from 40+ countries, with several sessions over 2 days.

The Madini Convention 2021 was centred around Demystifying Africa's Participation along the Minerals Value Chain. With distinguished speakers such as Rt Hon. Rebecca Kadaga, Hon. Peter Lokeris as well as other industry experts, attendees were treated to a wealth of knowledge on the mineral resource sector.

The Convention had a strong focus on the contemporary opportunities in the minerals sector for Africans. A special focus was placed on the new opportunities as Africa unites to jumpstart the African Continental Free Trade Area.




MADI -ASLF Webinar Series
